PRELUDE TO WAR

An Act of Defiance in 51 Feet

To the Legislature of the State of Maine.

THE undersigned, Females of the State of Maine, being deeply grieved at the passage of a resolve, at the late Session of Congress, by the House of Representatives, whereby it was declared:—"That no petition, memorial, resolution, or other taper, praying the Abolition of Slavery in the District of Columbia, or any State or itory in the United States, in which it now exists, shall be received by this se, or entertained in any way whatever;" and believing said resolve to be an gement of the Constitution of the United States, and an abridgment of the dom of speech, and of the right of petition, pray your honorable body to respect to the same rescinded.

We also pray that your petitioners may be heard before a committee of your honorable body, by counsel.





MONEY FLOW = MAINE DEPENDENCY



Davis Tillson of Rockland files his final annual report as Adjutant General



December 20, 1860


PRESIDENT LINCOLN ISSUES THE CALL

- 75000 troops to restore the union
- Maine = 10 regiments
 - 10 companies
 - 100 soldiers each
- 2nd Maine was the first regiment to leave Maine for the war
- The 1st Maine Infantry Regiment had been delayed by measles



- More than 4,500 Maine soldiers died of disease; another 2,800 died of wounds

THE DREADED DRAFT

By October of 1863, Civil War had raged for two and a half years – longer than anyone had anticipated.

In August, President Abraham Lincoln called for 300,000 more volunteers for the Union army. Maine was expected to provide about 9,000 of that number. Maine Adjutant General John Hodsdon knew that reaching the quota would be difficult.
