**EDWARD THOMAS: SOURCES** 

The assigned book for this course is Matthew Hollis, <u>Now All Roads Lead to</u>

<u>France: The Last Years of Edward Thomas</u> (Norton, 2011). Read at your own pace. I will give part of our class time to questions and comments on the reading.

The poems we will discuss in class can be found on-line from several sources. Just enter the author and title in your search engine, print a copy and bring it to class. I'll give a week's notice of the poems I would like to discuss. I will bring paper copies of "Up in the Wind" and "Adelstrop" to the first class.

## Biographies:

William Cooke, Edward Thomas: A Critical Biography (Faber, 1970)
Richard Emeny, Edward Thomas: A Life in Pictures (Enitharmon, 2017)
This is not a coffee table book. Pictures and text are both excellent.

R. George Thomas, <u>Edward Thomas</u>: <u>A Portrait</u> (Oxford, 1985) Thoughtful about the man and his writing. Jean Moorcroft Wilson, <u>Edward Thomas</u>

Two important memoirs are Helen Thomas, <u>Under Storm's Wing</u> (Carcanet, 1988) and Eleanor Farjeon, <u>Edward Thomas</u>: <u>The Last Four Years</u> (Sutton 1958) The second includes almost all the letters she received from ET.

The best collection of ET's poetry is Edna Longley ed., <u>Edward Thomas</u>: <u>The Annotated Collected Poems</u> (Bloodaxe, 2008). Prof. Longley spent much of a long, distinguished academic career writing about ET. This collection includes a thoughtful criticism of each of ET's 139 poems.
