Under vernacular there is a sub-heading: **oral baseballlese** which is spoken by almost all professional players of the game and of course by many fans. Mordant levity is one of the key features of this dialect. Oral baseballlese is seldom recorded accurately in writing. Mark Harris did it pretty good.
